## NEWS FROM AFAR

### *The Journey*

*The Journey Is The Thing* said the poet Homer in the Iliad. That is why Terrie and I are here in Chimbote, Peru for the next two plus years. We believe that life is a journey and that when we retired we would open this next chapter of our lives. Our work here is for no great deed or religious experience but is instead, our education in the emerging nations. It has always been our desire to live, work, and think in another language.

My first visit to Peru was in 1994 with Rotary International to develop a sanitation canal in hopes of reducing disease caused by poor sanitation. The project succeeded so well that it embarrassed the City of Chimbote into recognizing the barrios of invasion as part of the city. This resulted in sewers and electricity within the next two years.

Since then I have returned many times working on various projects and guiding American benefactors to view first hand how their funds are improving the conditions here in Chimbote. This trip is my 13<sup>th</sup>.

Peru is a magnificent country, about the size of Germany. It has four distinct eco regions; the Amazon, the Andes Mountains, the alto plano (high plains), and coastal desert. It is rich in history, traditions and music. Art and crafts reflect these traditions. Archeological ruins dating to before Christ are everywhere.

To better understand Chimbote try to imagine the following. You are standing in the cold Pacific Ocean (water temperature 45f). There is a dense fog 2 kilometers into the ocean over the Humboldt Current. You are looking across the driest desert in the world (average rainfall is 1/4 inch per year) a place with 400-foot dunes and not one plant. In the background you see the 2<sup>nd</sup> highest mountain range in the world topped by glistening glaciers. The temperature ranges from winter - 85/65f to summer 107/75f. And the sun travels across the northern sky.

Chimbote is located 450 kilometers north of the Capital City, Lima, and is just 700 kilometers south of the equator. Chimbote is a city with two industries, steel and fish processing. Chimbote perfume is the smoke that is emitted from manufacturing fishmeal and fertilizer. The infrastructure is for a city of about 90,000 people with a real population somewhere near 400,000. Throughout the 70's, 80's, and 90's there has been invasions of refugees from the mountains who suddenly appear during the night looking for jobs and family. Some of the barrios are named 2<sup>nd</sup> December or la Victoria to remember the details.

Terrie, my wife, a management consultant specializing in helping fortune 500 companies through change, is assisting the parish reorganize and endure the growing pains realized from its success.

I am responsible for the design, construction, equipping and staffing of the very first Hospice center in Peru. There will also be a center for the disabled within the same complex. The thinking is that the disabled can help care for the dying.

The Paroquia Senora del Perpetuo Socorro is led by Father Juan Davis Weed, a Catholic priest from Devils Lake, North Dakota. He has been working in Chimbote for 25 years. The parroquia serves about 40,000 people and 11 barrios. Some services include: a clinic, soup kitchens, school, social services, services for the disabled, housing for the poor, a center for battered women, several libraries, a computer lab, and much much more. The annual budget has grown from \$100,000 per year to \$850,000. This funding is entirely from donations. The American board of directors, Los Amigos de Padre Juan was founded in 1996 by Gary Zespy, Marlene Christenson, Robert Cikanek and myself to guarantee the parroquia's funding.

Money aside, we have a real need for doctors, nurses, plumbers, electricians, and others skilled in the trades to visit and transfer their knowledge to the people of Chimbote. Most visitors come for a week up to a month. The new visitors home will be completed in June and there will be living quarters and food for all who wish to come and share their gifts.

Here in Chimbote the people don't say "thank you for your gifts." Instead, they say "thank you for being our friend."

Thanks for the letter. It was so nice hearing from you and others. It seems as though those years were so long ago and I only have me to blame for not keeping in touch.

At present we are recovering from the earthquake 8+ in the south of Peru. 3+ here. No major damage but two of our wells collapsed and I have to arrange for clean water. One well supplies a soup kitchen and two class rooms. The other our medical post and another soup kitchen.

This afternoon I must design a cistern and water chlorination system. Isn't it interesting that this poor student is now responsible for so much. God does have a sense of humor.

Have fun at your reunion. Please say hi to everyone and tell them that we will have some 40,000 members of our parish including them in their prayers.

**Kinshasa,  
Democratic Republic of the Congo**

I am in Kinshasa working at the American Embassy, filling in for some folks who are back in the States on vacation. I will be here till the end of July.

Kinshasa was once a beautiful place, but 40 years of neglect, mis-management and outright theft by Mobutu have taken their toll. You can tell the drunk drivers here because they drive in a straight line, instead of zigzagging to miss the potholes. The hard-wired phone system died back in the 80's, so cell phones are the only option. The city and country are extremely poor, despite the tremendous mineral deposits. The people are very friendly, though, with no hints of racism/anti-white resentment...at least I have experienced none. There are many good restaurants, though they are expensive and thus only accessible to the Congolese elite and foreigners. Beer is cheap and quite good, so life is okay! The apartment I am staying in is about a block from the Congo River, and I can take a long walk along side it and look across at Brazzaville. But, I cannot leave Kinshasa because there are still periodic skirmishes between DROC (gov't) troops and various rebel groups, as well as the Ugandans, Rwandans, and Burundians.

That's about it from the Congo. It is a great experience. Keep in touch, and I will do the same.
